Short Assignment 1: Read an Article of Your Choosing

Library due date: if you use *Currents in Biblical Research*, you will need to request your article via Interlibrary loan by Mon Sept 11.

Assignment due date: Mon Sept 18 at 11 pm CST

Word Limit: the answer to the last question should not exceed 200 words

These directions have two parts. The first briefly explains what you will be expected to do. The second explains how to do things like locate articles.

What You Need to Do

Students need to pick an article related to the Old Testament from *Currents in Biblical Research*, *Interpretation*, or *Word & World*. See the introduction to "How to Do It" below if you're not sure which to pick or how to access the articles.

Students need to read the article they chose.

They need to answer these questions. They can do their work ahead of time and then upload each question onto Moodle.

- 1. What is the article you read?
 - a. Provide the correct citation, which should look like this:
 Author last name, Author first name. "Article Title: Subtitle." Journal Name Volume
 Number (Year): Beginning page—end page.
 - b. Example:
 - Tillema, Aron. "The Book of Jonah in Recent Research." *Currents in Biblical Research* 21 (2023): 145–77.
 - c. Note: ATLA provides citations (click on "Cite" on right side after you click on the article title). However, these citations are almost always formatted incorrectly, so avoid them (or use them to get the information and then rearrange it in the correct format).
- 2. Share a permanent web address to the article you chose on ATLA. If you're not sure how to do it, see #6 under "How to Do It" below.
- 3. In one or two sentences, explain why this article looked interesting to you. Be specific. This is your chance to talk about a personal connection with the field. Let your instructor get to know you as a person.
- 4. Provide a 200-word summary of the article.
 - a. If you chose an article from *Interpretation* or *Word and World*, start by writing, "The thesis (or main argument) of this article is ______." Then, explain the

- evidence the author gives to support the thesis. Lastly, explain whether you find the article convincing. Why or why not?
- b. If you chose an article from *Currents in Biblical Research*, describe at least three things taking place in the subfield. Generally, you do not need to talk about particular authors, but you should mention one article or book that sounds like it might be interesting for further study. Lastly, explain whether the article was illuminating. Explain why (e.g., was it easy to understand?).

How to Do It (If You Don't Know)

There are many types of articles on the Old Testament and Hebrew Bible. Some of these are too technical for first-year seminary students. For example, some only make sense if you know Hebrew. However, three journals are more accessible:

- Currents in Biblical Research¹: Biblical studies is made up of many subfields. When you're new to a subfield, it can be difficult to understand the conversations taking place. This journal publishes review articles, that is, articles that explain what's taking place with particular subfields. It's a great entrypoint for deeper study.
- Interpretation: A Journal of Bible and Theology, published by Union Presbyterian Seminary: This journal focuses on particular themes and is geared toward pastors, seminary students, and scholars.
- Word & World, published by Luther Seminary³: Like *Interpretation*, this journal focuses on particular themes and is geared toward pastors, seminary students, and scholars.

How can you tell what's in these journals? The easiest way is to go to the "ATLA Religion Database," or "ATLA" for short.

- 2. Scroll down to "Find Articles." Then click the "ATLA" tab.


Word & World is a quarterly journal of theology, published by the faculty of Luther Seminary, that is meant for readers who are concerned for Christian ministry in and to the world. The journal seeks to relate the word of God to the contemporary world and to relate theology to Christian ministry.

Now in its forty-first year of publication, *Word & World* presents theological articles and book reviews of interest to scholars and students but geared more directly toward those engaged in Christian ministry. Each 100+ page issue contains articles on the theme of that issue along with features such as "Face to Face" (different or opposing views on current questions in church and world); "Texts in Context" (providing preachers and teachers with reflections, insights, methods, and models to help in proclaiming the biblical message in a particular context); and substantial book reviews.





- 3. After clicking on the ATLA tab, go to where it says "Enter term(s):" Then, type JN "[enter journal name]" **The letters JN need to be capitalized.** So, you'll want to enter either:
 - a. JN "Currents in Biblical Research"
 - b. JN "Interpretation" or
 - c. JN "Word & World" NOTE: It won't work if you type out "and" so be sure to use the &symbol.
- 4. Next, you'll probably need to enter your credentials. After that, you should see a screen like this one: (SEE NEXT PAGE)



5. Scroll and find an article that looks good to you. It needs to deal with the Old Testament or you'll be asked to redo the assignment. Click on the article title, which will be in blue font with a number next to it. Example:




6. Now that you're on the article's webpage, you can answer questions #1 and #2 above. For the citation, use the information on the screen (and avoid the "Cite" feature because it doesn't work well). The permalink is on the right:




- 7. Next, you need to actually get the article so you can read it.
 - a. With *Word & World* and *Interpretation*, you can click to view the PDF's of the articles immediately:



- b. With *Currents in Biblical Research*, you'll need to request the article via inter-library loan, and it will take about a week to receive it. Here's how to request such an article:
 - i. On the article's webpage, click on the "Find it @ UD" link:




ii. On the next page, click on "Request Item through Interlibrary Loan/ E-Delivery":



iii. Next, you'll need to log into the ILL system.

iv. Next, the information on your article should automatically be populated on the ILL page. It should look like this, and you just need to click "Submit" on the bottom.



v. Your article should arrive within one week. You should be notified via email when it's available.

Submit your work no later than Monday, September 18 at 11:00 pm CST. You can type out everything ahead of time, and then you just need to copy and paste your answers into Moodle.
