BI 567: Women of Faith and Wisdom: English Old Testament Exegesis (3 credits)

Prerequisites: BI 511 Introduction to the Old Testament

BI 550 Introduction to the New Testament

Assessment: Letter grade or P/F by permission

Overview/Course Description:

This course will feature the accounts of Sarah and Hagar, the books of Esther and Ruth, and the "frame story" of Proverbs. We will consider the interplay of narrative and wisdom themes in the Hebrew Bible, as well as other contemporaneous works of literature and the relationships between women and men in the ancient world. A variety of exceptical methodologies will be employed to interpret historical and contemporary meanings throughout the course.

Course Objectives:

By participating fully in this course, students will

- 1. Read the accounts of Sarah and Hagar, the books of Esther, Ruth, and the frame story of Proverbs.
- 2. Choose among biblical passages for intensive exploration using exegetical methodologies, making use of multiple biblical commentaries that adopt various exegetical, theological, and ideological perspectives.
- 3. Reflect on and introduce new ways to encourage the distinctive contributions of individuals in both the ancient world and contemporary church and society.
- 4. Reflect theologically on all of the above.
