HT521 UNITED METHODIST HISTORY

Professor: Rev. Dr. Elmer M. Colyer

3 credits: letter grade

This course surveys the history of the United Methodist Church in relation to its antecedent institutions and traditions that are historically related to the Methodist movement. The course introduces students to the events, persons, and institutions of the people called Methodist from the time of John Wesley to the present. There will be lectures, readings, and open class discussions. This course fulfills the disciplinary requirement for ordination in the UM Church.

Course Objectives:

- 1. To develop a clear understanding of the history of Methodism from Wesley to the present
- 2. To understand how this history has shaped the UM Church today
- 3. To become aware of the diversity of United Methodism today
- 4. To learn to interpret the Methodist tradition to congregations
- 5. To learn to relate UM history to discipleship, character formation and the Church=s life & ministry
