FE 601: Pastoral Leadership

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Overview/Course Description:

This integrative practicum focuses on the essential functions of the offices of pastor, chaplain, and ministry leader. Topics covered include worship leadership, celebration of sacraments, wedding and funeral preparation, pastoral visits and observing proper etiquette. Each day of class includes reflection, discussion, and the practice of pastoral functions.

Course Objectives:

- 1. Practice and facilitate the preparation and leading of worship services, including public prayer and the celebration of sacraments.
- 2. Describe and practice the conduct of wedding rehearsals and services, funerals, memorials, and graveside services.
- 3. Practice and develop the art of pastoral calling in homes, hospitals, and other institutional settings.
- 4. Practice and facilitate the care of people and families at the end of life and in the journey of grief
