IN519 THEOLOGY AND PRACTICE OF MINISTRY - FALL 2024

Course Description

This introductory course for all incoming MAM students introduces theological education for ministry, with a focus on gaining basic skills in biblical literacy, theological reflection, practical theological strategies for ministry context analysis; and practices for a flourishing discipleship and ministry.

- Identify key theological concepts and vocabulary.
- Implement methods of contextual and practical theological reflection
- Identify major genres and themes of the Bible, and implement strategies for personal and ministerial study.
- Articulate and perform practices for a flourishing discipleship and ministry.
- Implement basic methods of theological and biblical research and writing.
