OVERVIEW/COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course introduces the Christian faith as understood by the Reformed tradition. Using contemporary and classic texts valued by the Reformed tradition, it examines the doctrine of humanity (created, fallen, and redeemed), Jesus Christ, atonement, salvation (justification and sanctification), the Holy Spirit, the church, sacraments, and last things.

This course is a required course for the M.A.R.T. Program and an elective in other degree programs.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

By participating fully in this class, students will be able to:

- 1) Define key terms and concepts of Christian theology and, more specifically, Reformed theology.
- 2) Understand how such terms and concepts relate to Holy Scripture and how they emerged and have developed in both the catholic and Reformed tradition.
- 3) Evaluate some of the Church's major theological claims in light of the criticisms of voices within and without the Church and in light of the demands of pastoral ministry today.

- Identify and articulate core commitments of the Christian tradition, with a focus on the Reformed tradition
- Identify how key theological commitments emerged and function within the Christian tradition and, more specifically, the Reformed tradition
- Describe and evaluate the core commitments of the catholic and Reformed tradition in conversation with historical and contemporary critics
- Explain how key theological terms and concepts have been understood and applied in Christian congregations of various times and places, and, more specifically, in congregations of the Reformed tradition
