OVERVIEW/COURSE DESCRIPTION

A survey of the Barthian literature – doctrine, exegetical, history of doctrine, political, homiletical and devotional: a digest of the contents of the thirteen volumes of the Church Dogmatics, followed by in-depth study of a selected volume of the Dogmatics or a particular doctrine.

This course is a required course for the M.A.R.T. Program and an elective in other degree programs.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

By participating fully in this class, students will be able to:

- 1) read, discuss, and critically analyze some of the most important theological texts in the 20th century.
- 2) Identify and discuss the key theological questions, concepts, and developments of the 20th century.
- 3) Evaluate Karl Barth's major theological claims in light of the criticisms of voices within and without the Church and in light of the demands of pastoral ministry today.
