

HT 540/440 What Christians Believe: Christian Doctrine I

3 credits: letter grade only

Prerequisite: HT501D & HT502D, or permission of the professor

Course Description:

This course introduces students to the content of the Christian faith as believed and confessed by the Christian church from the early church to the present day. **CHRISTIAN DOCTRINE I** examines the Trinity, revelation, Scripture, authority, method, creation, human nature, and sin. There will be lectures, readings, and discussions. This will include readings and discussions of a variety of contemporary perspectives, such as Third World, feminist, and other theologies.

Course Learning Objectives:

1. Outline the central ultimate beliefs (theological affirmations) of the doctrines covered in the paper
2. Interact with the great tradition of the church, the student's own ecclesial tradition, and the diversity of contemporary theological perspectives
3. Engage contemporary theological and ethical issues like the finality of Christ in a religiously plural world, the relation of the New Creation to culture, the ethnic diversity of the church, the relation of the ministry of the laity to the ministry of the ordained, the nature of the church and its mission in the world, etc.
4. Express the student's own theological and ethical perspectives in relation to CLO 1, 2, and 3
